'Where is the brother or sister whom you are killing each day in clandestine warehouses, in rings of prostitution, in children used for begging, in exploiting undocumented labour? Let us not look the other way. There is greater complicity than we think. The issue involves everyone!' (E.G. 211)



'The father said: My son, you are with me always and all I have is yours. But it was only right that we should celebrate and rejoice, because your brother here was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found' (Luke 15:32)

If we are to share our lives with others and generously give of ourselves, we also have to realise that every person is worthy of our giving. Not for their physical appearance, their abilities, their way of thinking, but rather because every human being is the object of God's infinite tenderness...every person is immensely holy and deserves our love. (E.G. 274)
