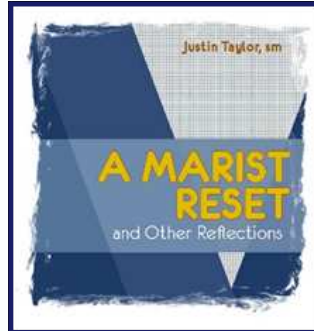
General Administration

A MARIST RESET



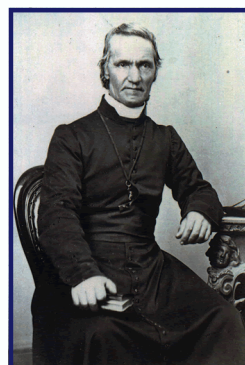
"A Marist Reset", written by Fr Justin Taylor, is a series of reflections based on the retreat he gave in the U.S. in June 2018, and on other talks given at *La Neylière*, Sydney and Atlanta. Some of the topics presented in the publication are: "Who was Mary for Jean-Claude Colin", "The Utopianism of Jean-Claude Colin", "Fr. Colin's Eschatology", "Fr. Colin as a Spiritual Guide", and "'Hidden and Unknown' – A Marist Insight for Today". In the English version, the book is 116 pages long. It is also available in

French and Spanish. Order forms were sent to the major superiors. The book offers a deep but easily read reflection on Marist spirituality which will enrich Marist religious and laity alike. LIVING AMONG THE NORTHLAND MĀORI: DIARY OF FATHER ANTOINE GARIN, 1844–1846

In New Zealand the translation of Fr Antoine Garin's diary "Living among the Northland Maori: Diary of Father Antoine Garin, 1844-1846" will soon be launched. The book is the first full English translation of Garin's journals and letters, and a major contribution to the early history of European settlement in Aotearoa and a compelling insight into Māori customs, values and beliefs of the time.

Antoine Garin was a French Marist missionary. When he arrived in New Zealand he first worked for a few years as provincial, but



then moved to a mission station in Northland, where he shared the Maori way of life: his everyday language was Maori, he lived with Maori assistants, he often slept under the stars. Further, he genuinely enjoyed Maori company and built up significant friendships. After six years he was transferred to Auckland, where he ministered as a chaplain to a large body of mainly Irish army veterans. Quickly seeing their need for structures of support, in less than three years he had put up two churches and two schools. In 1850 he was appointed to Nelson, where he built six churches and set up a school, open to students of all faiths.
