#### WE ARE THE LIVING CHURCH

As Christians, we have just come out of the 40-day season of Lent and celebrated the Easter Triduum. Lent recalls other periods of 40 days or years that appear in the Bible. The 40 years that the Israelites spent in the wilderness after fleeing from Egypt. The 40 days, Jesus spent in the desert being tempted by Satan. All these are periods of uncertainty which we could relate to Lent and Easter season 2020 plagued with fear and anxiety around COVID-19.

People persisted by trusting in God. These stories give us people who we can relate to during this time of physical distancing. These stories also give me hope in the way that each group made it through. Hope, in the way that the Israelites leaned on each other as a community, something that we have been invited to do as we learn to support each other. Hope in Jesus whose' beginning of ministry was marked by trial and isolation. Physical distancing and self-quarantine offer challenges: working from home and homeschooling children; loneliness, practicing patience while spending more time than usual in small spaces with family.

When our "social distancing" prompted the suspension of all church activities and masses, we started hearing the Eucharistic Celebration online or through various media. Many people continued to link in with our own parish on Facebook, Twitter and the website to celebrate our own prayer moments. Indeed we were physically deprived to go to Church but we were never deprived to share the presence of each other and to celebrate our faith together. In the Bible, church is always a reference to people, not a building. The church is at its best when people inside the building take Jesus' message outside the building and serve those they meet. I have seen people taking the dogs of cocooning or quarantined neighbours on walks, embracing new hobbies that involve creativity, calling and writing letters to loved ones, by people using chalk to write encouraging messages on the pavements, painting, drawing and crocheting rainbows for our railings. At home parents are sharing ideas of how to fill their children's time; people are dropping off food and shopping to neighbours in need; landlords who have stopped collecting rent aware that their tenants maybe struggling without wages; housing companies who are offering free apartments to healthcare and frontline workers.

So let us wake up every day with the knowledge that while we may be doing nothing, we are doing exactly what is needed. We are doing this for ourselves and for other people. Be proud of yourself. The isolation will not last forever. There is so much good in the world. We have not been abandoned. God was with the Israelites, and Jesus, and he continues to be with us each and every day.

## A "Time Capsule"

We are very conscious of that on the Parish Team and are holding on to copies of everything and keeping them for the archives.

One specific suggestion for treasuring this time is to put together a "Time Capsule". It could be called "My Covid-19 Time Capsule". The full details and page templates can be found on our Facebook and Website, but the main headings are the following:

Photographs from this time; a daily journal; some local newspaper cutouts; artwork; family reflections; special memories. Personal details could be included like: my favourite...toy, colour, animal, food, show, movie, book, activity, place, song.....my best friends...my age, height, weight and shoe size. How I have felt at times...what I have learnt...what I am thankful for...things I am looking forward to doing when this is over.

What is happening in the local area? What am I doing to keep myself busy at home? Include a set of hand prints....and maybe foot prints. What special occasions occurred during this time..Birthdays...St Patrick's day...Anniversaries...Easter..etc. You could write a letter to yourself, to be read in the future. What about interviewing your parents and recording their answers, and also asking them to write a letter to you. These are just some ideas for what could be included in your time capsule. I'm sure you can think of many others items that could be include. Finally place all these items in a box or tin.
