GREETINGS FROM PARIS!

Over the past six months, the restrictions imposed on gatherings because of COVID-19 have not just been an inconvenience, they have diminished the quality of human life. CATHOLIC YOUTH SUMMER CAMPS IN NORWAY, JULY 2020





Andreas Rupprecht (Nor) writes: "After being obliged to cancel all Easter camps, the Norwegian Catholic Youth organisation (NUK) was very happy when they were able to organise six summer camps for children and youths. We followed national health guidelines e.g. reduced numbers, frequent hand washing and no self-service meals. We were thus able to offer to 270 youngsters and group leaders the experience of a week of "faith, fellowship and action", as NUK has in its Statutes.

The camps combine Catholic catechesis delivered by group leaders, daily masses and prayer times combined with summer holiday activities. Some of these activities are a tradition that dates back generations because many of the leaders themselves attended camps in their own youth. A considerable number of Catholic marriages and even some priestly vocations have their origins in these camps.

This year, I took part in both the junior (12–14) and youth (15–18) camps. Apart from celebrating Mass and hearing confessions, my role was to be present in the group, supporting the leadership team both in planning and evaluation. I didn't escape odd-jobs such as driving to the local pharmacy or doing the dishes! For the juniors, after a rainy day indoors, I



organised a late-evening walk in the woods with night prayer in the fields."
