BICENTENARY OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT IN ST PATRICK'S

THE HISTORY OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

In 1817 an Irish priest, Fr Jeremiah O'Flynn, arrived in Sydney, where at that time there were no resident Catholic priests. The only clergy sanctioned by the British Government were Anglican ministers. Fr Jeremiah commenced a semi-clandestine ministry Catholic convicts and free settlers. Since there were no Catholic churches in Sydney, he used private homes for the celebration of Masses. In May 1818 the governor arrested O'Flynn, and deported him as an illegal immigrant. Whether by accident or design is unknown, but Fr Jeremiah left the consecrated communion sacrament in a home prior to his capture. It became a focus of prayer for a small group of Sydney Catholics, who kept daily before the Eucharistic sacrament. It was on that site that in 1840 St Patrick's arose.



Hundreds of people, including bishops from all around Australia, filled Sydney's beloved St Patrick's Church Hill on Sunday 6 May for an historic Mass commemorating 200 years of the preservation of the Blessed Sacrament in Australia. Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP, who presided over the Mass, pointed out that the site of St Patrick's could be considered the birthplace of the Catholic Church in Australia.

Parish Priest Fr Michael Whelan welcomed those present and recalled how two centuries ago it were "the lay faithful who kept the Eucharistic faith alive against the odds." Following the Mass Archbishop Fisher thanked all those involved in organizing the bicentenary Mass and he encouraged those present to have hope for the future of the Catholic Church in Australia. "The Church of

Australia which began here all those years ago could never have imagined what was ahead for us 200 years later. They probably thought that they were doomed, that things were desperate, that they might never have the sacraments or a priest. And look at what was built in the generations after".
