

### DEVELOPING THE MINISTRY OF INTERCESSION IN THE EUROPEAN PROVINCE

Myles Moriarty SM (Eng) died on the 20th of February 2020, aged 88 years, after a full life as a Marist teaching in England and then in Samoa, until ill health forced him to return home to England. For several years he was chaplain to a retreat house run by religious sisters. Eventually he returned to the community of Blackburn, his home town, where he continued his ministry of accompaniment, celebrating Mass at a local convent, as well as providing individual retreats for some of his confrères. Although retired from active ministry, Myles felt strongly that Marists his age should continue to walk with confreres still involved in active ministry. He proposed to the 2017 Provincial Chapter that the Provincial may appoint confreres to be directly associated through prayer and intercession with a Marist pastoral activity.

The Chapter accepted the proposal of this Ministry of Intercession as part of the Work of Mary. Bridges of prayer and solidarity were built across the province and beyond in the wider Marist world just as Jesus sends out his disciples two by two (Luke 10: 1), intending them to bless and encourage one another. Des Hanrahan (Eng), coordinator of the ministry, writes, "Our thanks go to Marists in Europe who have accepted an appointment to the Ministry, as Intercessors and as Prayer Companions, ensuring that the Work of Mary continues to be supported by a constant network of prayer". ## THE SAHAGÚN HOSTEL REOPENS! SAHAGUN, SPAIN

The COVID pandemic has had a devastating impact on us all in terms of loss of loved ones and the routines of human life that maintain our wellbeing. In Spain, the Camino de Santiago, normally packed with pilgrims, was closed for six months. As many countries now begin to ease travel restrictions, including Spain, the doors are open again to welcome pilgrims. However, things have changed.





According to Angel Anton (Spa) from the Marist community at Sahagún, "Because of COVID restrictions, our capacity has been

reduced to a maximum of 29 people per day instead of 40. In May, we welcomed 140 pilgrims from more than 30 nations, mostly from Europe. This is approximately 15% of those we hosted in the same month in 2019. In June, the daily average was ten people.

We offer pilgrims as scaled-down version of the specific activities characteristic of our hostel, a Christian Welcome - the pilgrim's coffee, the mass and blessing, and the shared dinner. It is only natural that the health restrictions continue to have an impact on our activities. We are hopeful that as the pandemic situation improves, we will return to the normality for which we long at all levels and parts of life."





### "Maristes en education" Walk, June 12

The "Maristes en Education" group of the Marist school in Bury-Rosaire undertook a short pilgrimage linking places of Marist interest in the area. Agnès et Blandine, members of this Marist laity group, write: "There were about thirty of us carrying in our hearts the intentions of the educational community under the gaze of Mary, as we linked our Marist schools. We walked along the path that unites our campuses, through our grounds, our roads and paths, from the Collège du Rosaire in St Leu la Forêt, on to the high school in Bury and finally to Bury-Sup in Margency.
