MARIST YOUTH LEADERS PROGRAM IN NEW ZEALAND

Sometimes opportunities that you would never imagine arise out of nowhere. That happened to me when I heard about the MYL (Marist Youth Leaders) program. I asked Fr. Mark Walls, a Marist Father from New Zealand, for information. He responded with a generous invitation to participate in this program that he has been carrying out for almost 25 years with the 9 Marist schools in New Zealand.

This is part of the magic that appears when Marists work in a network. For a week, boys and girls in their final year of high school learn and develop fundamental leadership skills



such as teamwork, a principle-centred living, being proactive, perseverance, servant leadership... It is a great way to prepare our young people to accept without fear the difficult task of leadership. This is something we need in Mexico and any part of the Marist world. In addition, we were able to discover a beautiful, peaceful country, full of wonderful corners and its own culture, the Maori, which invites you to communion with nature and contact with your roots. There I also found my Marist roots, since New Zealand was one of the destinations of the first Marists in Western Oceania in 1838. The work of Bishop Pompallier and the Marists is still remembered and highly valued in that country. So, I feel grateful and privileged for everything I experienced and learned in the three weeks I spent there, in the company of two teachers from the Franco-English school of Mexico. A time to return to my roots, discover new realities, and see that the *Marist connection between different parts of the world is still alive and giving life*. Mary, Queen of the Society of Mary, make fruitful the work of your children.

SAHAGUN, AN OMNES GENTES COMMUNITY AND PROJECT.



After Fr Daniel Fernández left for his new mission in Mexico in September 2024, I took on the role of interim director of the *Auberge de la Santa Cruz, our Marist hostel for pilgrims on their way to Santiago de Compostela*. I was assisted by Antonio Fernández while awaiting the arrival of a new director in Sahagún. Since April 1, 2025, a new confrere has joined the Sahagún community to assume the role of director of the Marist hostel of La Santa Cruz. This is Matthew Crawford, from New Zealand.

Meetings have been held so far not only to establish the objectives

for the year 2025, but also to allow the new director to discover, slowly but surely, what characterizes the mission of Sahagún: *an international mission, Omnes Gentes*. The current community is composed of Fathers Antonio Fernández (Spain), Paul Molbwet (Vanuatu), Valentin Aparicio (Spain), and Matthew Crawford (New Zealand). This community thanks Daniel Fernández, as well as John McAllister (now in Ireland), for their service and dedication to the pilgrims. It also warmly welcomes not only Matthew Crawford, but also Valentin Aparicio, who joined the Sahagún community last September.

Repairs, cleaning, and laundry work has been done, and the hostel opened its doors on Saturday, March 15, 2025. Now we are in the pilgrim season and the walkers come streaming in ...
